

CLEARING PERMIT

Granted under section 51E of the Environmental Protection Act 1986

Purpose Permit number: CPS 2701/3

Permit Holder: Rocla Pty Ltd (T/A Rocla Quarry Products)

Duration of Permit: 8 February 2013 – 8 February 2033

The Permit Holder is authorised to clear native vegetation subject to the following conditions of this Permit.

PART I-CLEARING AUTHORISED

1. Purpose for which clearing may be done

Clearing for the purpose of sand extraction.

2. Land on which clearing is to be done

Lot M1899 on Diagram 10521, LENNARD BROOK, 6503

3. Area of clearing

The Permit Holder must not clear more than 17.6 hectares of native vegetation within the area hatched yellow on attached Plan 2701/3.

4. Clearing authorised

The Permit Holder shall not clear any native vegetation after 8 February 2018.

5. Application

This Permit allows the Permit Holder to authorise persons, including employees, contractors and agents of the Permit Holder, to clear native vegetation authorised under this Permit subject to compliance with the conditions of this Permit and approval from the Permit Holder.

6. Compliance with assessment sequence and management procedures

Prior to clearing any native vegetation under conditions 1, 2 and 3 of this Permit, the Permit Holder must comply with the Assessment Sequence and the Management Procedures set out in Part II of this Permit.

PART II – ASSESSMENT SEQUENCE AND MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES

7. Clearing authorised (staging)

The Permit Holder shall not clear native vegetation unless actively mining within 3 months of the authorised clearing being undertaken.

8. Avoid, minimise etc clearing

In determining the amount of native vegetation to be cleared authorised under this Permit, the Permit Holder must have regard to the following principles, set out in order of preference:

- (a) avoid the clearing of native vegetation;
- (b) minimise the amount of native vegetation to be cleared; and
- (c) reduce the impact of clearing on any environmental value.

9. Dieback and weed control

When undertaking any clearing or other activity authorised under this Permit, the Permit Holder must take the following steps to minimise the risk of the introduction and spread of weeds and dieback:

- (a) clean earth-moving machinery of soil and vegetation prior to entering and leaving the area to be cleared;
- (b) shall only move soils in dry conditions;
- (c) ensure that no dieback or weed-affected soil, mulch, fill or other material is brought into the area to be cleared; and
- (d) restrict the movement of machines and other vehicles to the limits of the areas to be cleared.

10. Offsets

The Permit Holder must implement and adhere to the offset commitments as outlined in RPS Environmental and Planning Pty Ltd letter and attached figures and appendixes dated 22 December 2011, titled "APPEAL AGAINST REFUSAL TO GRANT CLEARING PERMITS (CPS 2757/1; CPS 2860/1; CPS 2701/1; CPS 2142/1 AND CPS 2515/1) – VARIOUS SITES IN THE SHIRE OF SERPENTINE-JARRAHDALE, SHIRE OF GINGIN AND CITY OF WANNEROO" and including but not limited to:

- (a) The submission of a site specific restoration plan for the area hatched yellow on attached Plan 2701/3 to the CEO within 6 months of commencing clearing approved under this permit.
- (b) The site specific restoration plan for the area hatched yellow on attached Plan 2701/3 must be approved by the CEO prior to commencing restoration works.
- (c) A site specific contingency plan, consistent with the methodology in the approved site specific restoration plan, is submitted to the CEO within 6 months of determining that CEO approved restoration criteria have not been met.
- (d) The site specific contingency plan, consistent with the methodology in the approved site specific restoration plan, must be approved by the CEO prior to commencing the contingency plan.
- (e) In respect to the areas hatched yellow on attached Plan 2701/3, the Permit Holder shall enter into a conservation covenant, agreement to reserve or some other form of binding undertaking to establish and maintain vegetation within 24 months of determining that CEO approved restoration criteria have been met.
- (f) The conservation covenant, agreement to reserve or some other form of binding undertaking to establish and maintain vegetation shall include, but not be limited to, the following conditions:
 - (i) native vegetation in the area subject to the *conservation reserve* must not be cleared, other than for clearing required under the *Bush Fires Act 1954*;
 - (ii) the land subject to the *conservation reserve* shall not be used for the purpose of cultivation of crops or pasture, or for the de-pasturing of any stock; and
 - (iii) the conservation reserve is to apply in perpetuity and be registered on the title of the property.

PART III - RECORD KEEPING AND REPORTING

11. Records to be kept

The Permit Holder must maintain the following records for activities done pursuant to this Permit:

- (a) In relation to the clearing of native vegetation authorised under this Permit:
 - the species composition, structure and density of the cleared area;
 - (ii) the location where the clearing occurred, recorded using a Global Positioning System (GPS) unit set to Geocentric Datum Australia 1994 (GDA94), expressing the geographical coordinates in Eastings and Northings or decimal degrees;
 - (iii) the date that the area was cleared; and
 - (iv) the size of the area cleared (in hectares).
- (b) In relation to the offset of areas pursuant to condition 10:
 - the location of any area of offsets recorded using a Global Positioning System (GPS) unit set to Geocentric Datum Australia 1994 (GDA94), expressing the geographical coordinates in Eastings and Northings or decimal degrees;
 - (ii) a description of the offset activities undertaken;

(iii) the size of the offset area (in hectares):

(iv) results of measurements undertaken against restoration success criteria: and

(v) evidence of conservation covenant, agreement to reserve or some other form of binding undertaking to establish and maintain vegetation, where required.

12. Reporting

(a) The Permit Holder must provide to the CEO on or before 30 June of each year, a written report:

(i) of records required under condition 11 of this Permit; and

- (ii) concerning activities done by the Permit Holder under this Permit between 1 January to 31 December of the preceding calendar year.
- (b) If no clearing authorised under this Permit was undertaken between 1 January to 31 December of the preceding calendar year, a written report confirming that no clearing under this permit has been carried out, must be provided to the CEO on or before 30 June of each year.
- (c) Prior to 8 November 2032, the Permit Holder must provide to the CEO a written report of records required under condition 11 of this Permit where these records have not already been provided under condition 12(a) of this Permit.

DEFINITIONS

The following meanings are given to terms used in this Permit:

conservation reserve means a conservation covenant, agreement to reserve or some other form of binding undertaking to establish and maintain vegetation

dieback means the effect of Phytophthora species on native vegetation;

dry conditions means when soils (not dust) do not freely adhere to rubber tyres, tracks, vehicle chassis or wheel arches;

fill means material used to increase the ground level, or fill a hollow;

mulch means the use of organic matter, wood chips or rocks to slow the movement of water across the soil surface and to reduce evaporation; and

weed/s means any plant -

- (a) that is declared under the section 22 of the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act; or
- (b) published in the former Department of Environment and Conservation Regional Weed Assessments, regardless of ranking; or
- (c) not indigenous to the area concerned.

2.1. Existing environment and information

2.1.1. Description of the native vegetation under application

Good: Structure significantly altered by multiple disturbance; retains basic structure/ability to regenerate (Keighery

Excellent: Vegetation structure intact; disturbance affecting individual species, weeds non-aggressive (Keighery 1994)

Comment

The condition of the native vegetation under application was sourced from the site inspection conducted on the 3 November 2008 (DEC, 2008).

The area under application have been identified as three vegetation habitat types:

- Casuarina humilis closed heath;
- Banksia spp.-Eucalyptus todtiana low open woodland; and
- Eucalyptus marginata-Corymbia calophylla open forest over Banksia grandis.

The vegetation ranges from intact structure and minimal disturbance to weed / stock disturbance areas.

3. Assessment of application against clearing principles

The application has been assessed against the clearing principles, in accordance with s510 of the Environmental Protection Act 1986, and the proposed clearing is at variance to Principle (a) & (b); may be at variance to Principles (d) & (g); and is not likely to be at variance to the remaining clearing Principles.

A review of current environmental information reveals no new additional information. Therefore the assessment against the clearing principles has not changed and can be found in the Clearing Permit Decision Report CPS2701/1.

Planning instrument, Native Title, Previous EPA decision or other matter.

Comments

Appeal determination on 7 October 2010 allowed in part the clearing of 17.6 hectares of native vegetation as outlined in Figure 2 of the Office of the Appeals Convenors, Report to the Minister for Environment, Appeal number C023 of 2009 (Office of the Appeals Convenor, 2010). The Minister for Environment's appeal determination was subject to the following:

- 1.Habitat trees at the site being identified by Rocla and excluded from the proposal, where practicable, having regard to the location of the sand resource;
- 2. Requirement to restore degraded areas onsite which are not proposed to be cleared;
- 3. Securing remnant native vegetation offsite in the event restoration is unsuccessful at a positive ratio, with the actual ratio to be determined by the DEC through conditions, taking into account the quality of the restoration (that is, a higher ratio where restoration fails):
- 4.Consistent with the Offset Position Statement, on-site restoration needs to be coupled with suitable long-term management arrangements where Rocla is not the owner of the land, such that the restoration has a long lasting benefit (Minister for Environment, 2010).

The former DEC was provided with an offset proposal and determined it to be in accordance with the Minister for Environment's appeal determination.

Planning consent and extractive industry licence was granted by the Shire of Gingin on 3 January 2013 (Shire of Gingin 2013).
