2.1. Existing environment and information

2.1.1. Description of the native vegetation under application

| <p>Beard vegetation associations have been mapped for the whole of Western Australia. One Beard vegetation association has been mapped within the application area:</p> <p>511: Medium woodland; salmon gum and morrel (GIS Database).</p> <p>A flora and vegetation survey of the application area and an adjacent area was conducted by botanists from Botanica Consulting in September 2011. Eight vegetation communities were recorded during the survey and seven of these occurred within the application area (Botanica Consulting, 2011).</p> <p>1) Low woodland of <i>Eucalyptus melanoxylon</i> over scrub of <i>Melaleuca pauperiflora</i> subsp. <i>pauperiflora</i> and <i>Melaleuca lateriflora</i>;</p> <p>2) Open mallee of <i>Eucalyptus salicola</i> over dense heath of <i>Melaleuca lateriflora</i>;</p> <p>3) Regrowth forest of <i>Eucalyptus flocktoniae</i>/E. <i>annulata</i> over scrub of <i>Melaleuca pauperiflora</i> subsp. <i>pauperiflora</i>;</p> <p>4) Low regrowth forest of <i>Eucalyptus salubris</i> over low scrub of <i>Acacia merrallii</i> and <i>Melaleuca pauperiflora</i> subsp. <i>pauperiflora</i>;</p> <p>5) Open low woodland of <i>Eucalyptus salmonophloia</i> over open Mallee of <i>Eucalyptus eremophila</i>/E. <i>cylindrocarpa</i> over heath of <i>Melaleuca hamata</i>;</p> <p>6) Low scrub of <i>Allocasuarina helmsii</i> over low sedges of <i>Lepidosperma</i> sp. Western Areas Limited proposes to clear up to 5 hectares of native vegetation within a boundary of approximately 242 hectares, for the purpose of mineral exploration and associated activities. The project is located approximately 82 kilometres east of Hyden, in the Shire of Kondinin.</p> | <p>Very Good: Vegetation structure altered; obvious signs of disturbance (Keighery, 1994).</p> | <p>The vegetation condition was assessed by botanists from Botanica Consulting (2011).</p> <p>The application area is located near the existing Forrestania Nickel Project.</p> <p>Clearing permit CPS 4795/1 was granted by the Department of Mines and Petroleum on 5 April 2012 and was valid from 28 April 2012 to 31 December 2016. The permit authorised the clearing of up to 5 hectares of native vegetation within a boundary of approximately 242 hectares.</p> <p>On 6 September 2016, the Permit Holder applied to amend CPS 4795/1 to extend the permit duration to 31 December 2020, and to change the name of the permit holder from Western Areas NL to Western Areas Limited due to a change of company name. The area of clearing authorised and the permit boundaries remain unchanged.</p> |

3. Assessment of application against clearing principles

Comments

Western Areas Limited has applied to amend the permit, to extend the permit duration to 31 December 2020. The size of the area approved to clear (5 hectares) and the permit boundaries remain unchanged.

The amendment to extend the permit duration by four years is unlikely to result in any significant change to the environmental impacts of the proposed clearing (GIS Database).

The amendment application has been assessed against the clearing principles, planning instruments and other matters in accordance with s.51O of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986*. Environmental information has been reviewed, and the assessment of the proposed clearing against the clearing principles remains consistent with the assessment contained in decision report CPS 4795/1.

Comments

There is one Native Title Claim (WC2000/007) over the area under application (DAA, 2016). This claim has been registered with the National Native Title Tribunal on behalf of the claimant group. However, the tenure has been granted in accordance with the future act regime of the *Native Title Act 1993* and the nature of the act (i.e. the proposed clearing activity) has been provided for in that process, therefore the granting of a clearing permit is not a future act under the *Native Title Act 1993*.

There are no registered Aboriginal Sites of Significance within the application area (DAA, 2016). It is the proponent's responsibility to comply with the *Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972* and ensure that no Aboriginal Sites of Significance are damaged through the clearing process.

It is the proponent's responsibility to liaise with the Department of Environment Regulation, the Department of Parks and Wildlife and the Department of Water, to determine whether a Works Approval, Water Licence, Bed and Banks permit, or any other licences or approvals are required for the proposed works.

P1 Priority One - Poorly-known species:

Species that are known from one or a few locations (generally five or less) which are potentially at risk. All occurrences are either: very small; or on lands not managed for conservation, e.g. agricultural or pastoral lands, urban areas, road and rail reserves, gravel reserves and active mineral leases; or otherwise under threat of habitat destruction or degradation. Species may be included if they are comparatively well known from one or more locations but do not meet adequacy of survey requirements and appear to be under immediate threat from known threatening processes. Such species are in urgent need of further survey.

P2 Priority Two - Poorly-known species:

Species that are known from one or a few locations (generally five or less), some of which are on lands managed primarily for nature conservation, e.g. national parks, conservation parks, nature reserves and other lands with secure tenure being managed for conservation. Species may be included if they are comparatively well known from one or more locations but do not meet adequacy of survey requirements and appear to be under threat from known threatening processes. Such species are in urgent need of further survey.

P3 Priority Three - Poorly-known species:

Species that are known from several locations, and the species does not appear to be under imminent threat, or from few but widespread locations with either large population size or significant remaining areas of apparently suitable habitat, much of it not under imminent threat. Species may be included if they are comparatively well known from several locations but do not meet adequacy of survey requirements and known threatening processes exist that could affect them. Such species are in need of further survey.

P4 Priority Four - Rare, Near Threatened and other species in need of monitoring:

(a) Rare. Species that are considered to have been adequately surveyed, or for which sufficient knowledge is available, and that are considered not currently threatened or in need of special protection, but could be if present circumstances change. These species are usually represented on conservation lands.

(b) Near Threatened. Species that are considered to have been adequately surveyed and that are close to qualifying for Vulnerable, but are not listed as Conservation Dependent.

(c) Species that have been removed from the list of threatened species during the past five years for reasons other than taxonomy.

Principles for clearing native vegetation:

- (a) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it comprises a high level of biological diversity.
- (b) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it comprises the whole or a part of, or is necessary for the maintenance of, a significant habitat for fauna indigenous to Western Australia.
- (c) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it includes, or is necessary for the continued existence of, rare flora.
- (d) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it comprises the whole or a part of, or is necessary for the maintenance of a threatened ecological community.
- (e) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it is significant as a remnant of native vegetation in an area that has been extensively cleared.
- (f) Native vegetation should not be cleared if it is growing in, or in association with, an environment associated with a watercourse or wetland.
- (g) Native vegetation should not be cleared if the clearing of the vegetation is likely to cause appreciable land degradation.
- (h) Native vegetation should not be cleared if the clearing of the vegetation is likely to have an impact on the environmental values of any adjacent or nearby conservation area.
- (i) Native vegetation should not be cleared if the clearing of the vegetation is likely to cause deterioration in the quality of surface or underground water.
- (j) Native vegetation should not be cleared if clearing the vegetation is likely to cause, or exacerbate, the incidence or intensity of flooding.
