



# Application for a clearing permit (area permit)

Environmental Protection Act 1986 s 51E

Clearing of native vegetation is prohibited in Western Australia except where a clearing permit has been granted or an exemption applies. A person who causes or allows unauthorised clearing commits an offence.

### Part 1 Assessment bilateral agreement

The native vegetation clearing processes under Part V of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986* (EP Act) have been accredited by the Commonwealth of Australia under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act) and can be assessed under an assessment bilateral agreement.

To be assessed under the assessment bilateral agreement, the proposed clearing action must be referred to the Commonwealth under the EPBC Act prior to submitting this application form and Annex C7 must also be completed.

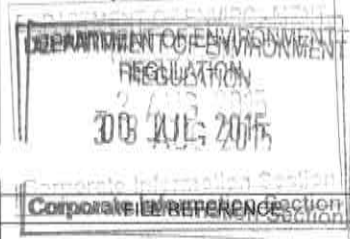

Lot 400 Canning Road, Carmel: Narrow corridor between two other Lots, 20m to 26m wide and 200m long at the North-East corner of Lot 400, located from Canning road, running South, supporting current property access track, and a 60 m x 60 m muster area at the south end of the access area. After excluding a 3 m track on eastern interface with adjacent property under Local Government Fire access requirements, the remaining width of the access area vegetation will be less than 11m – therefore the total proposed area is less than 0.58 ha.
